

Ohio Peace and Conflict Studies Fund

All donations are made through the OPCSF at the Hudson Community Foundation are tax deductible in the U.S. 100% of all donations go directly toward the fund purpose**

The Ohio Peace and Conflict Studies Fund was developed to help support education related endeavors which promote the application of constructive, nonviolent forums, processes, and techniques for resolving local to global issues. This includes supporting student scholarships, student participation in related conferences, research, international study opportunities, and/or internships.

As of 2024, Ohio has 19+ colleges and universities with peace and conflict studies related programs. Ohio has also been in the top ten states in the United States, over the last decade, for refugee resettlement. Refugees have been forced to leave their country due to conflict, persecution, or human-made or natural disasters.

The fund was started, in part, because as of January 2024, there is no place in Ohio to donate to students studying peace and conflict studies that was not university or college specific and there are few funding sources for students residing in Ohio designated as refugees.

Depending on the annual fund total, allocations may be provided for one or more of the following:

- Scholarship(s) for a student to study peace/conflict studies or a related field at an Ohio college/university, including international study away related courses.
- Funds provided to a college/university in Ohio with a peace/conflict studies program to support student participation in related trainings or conferences,
- Funds provided to a student to conduct related peace/conflict research through an Ohio college/university
- Funds provided to a college/university in Ohio to support student intern(s) working on a peace/conflict related project in the local/global community.

Special preference is given to:

- Ohio college students from Summit County, Ohio, currently enrolled in a peace/conflict studies program at an accredited Ohio college/university, having completed at least one semester with at least a "C" average.
- Ohio students who have, at some point, held refugee status, who are currently residing in Summit County, Ohio.
